#### I. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner Bob Dallari called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Commissioner Samuel Ings led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### II. CHAIRMAN'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

Commissioner Dallari welcomed everyone and called on Commissioner Pete Clarke to provide a report on the November 9<sup>th</sup> TDLCB meeting which included the annual TD Public Hearing.

Commissioner Clarke reported that the TD Public Hearing was very well attended and attendees received a presentation on the new, real time LYNX bus tracker app and the others that are soon to be available to the paratransit community. In addition, attendees heard a presentation from Ms. Carmen Weatherford, from the Orange County EMS Office of the Medical Director which provided an overview of the statewide special needs registry. At the TDLCB meeting which followed, Committee members approved the previous meeting minutes, the 2018 meeting schedule, Access LYNX's Annual Operating Report and the Annual Expenditure Report. TDLCB members, he reported, also recommended approval of the CTC Memorandum of Agreement and the Quality Assurance Task Force recommendations for new members and alternates. In addition, TDLCB meeting is scheduled on February 15, 2018.

Commissioner Dallari provided a report on the December 1<sup>st</sup> Commuter Rail Commission meeting. He reported four of the five funding partners had approved funding for consultant services for a transition study and Orange County was approved to serve as the escrow agent and Seminole County will handle the procurement action for the study. Commissioner Dallari noted that SunRail was not scheduled to run Christmas Day and New Year's Day, however, work was being done to try and schedule service on New Year's Day to accommodate downtown events. Mayor Dyer confirmed that there will be service, but the schedule was not available at this time. Commissioner Dallari recognized outgoing CAC chairman, Mr. Tom O'Hanlon, outgoing TAC Chair, Ms. Mary Moskowitz, and outgoing TSMO Chair, Ms. Joedel Zaballero. He reported that the Personnel Committee would be meeting immediately following the board meeting to review proposals that had been received for Executive Search firms and develop a recommendation for consideration by the full Board at the next meeting on February 14.

#### III. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mr. Harold Barley reported that Commissioner Fisher would be in attendance for Mayor Jose Alvarez. He introduced guests Mr. Jim Hartmann, Orlando Economic Partnership and Dr. Essam Radwan, retired UCF Professor, who both spoke briefly. Mr. Barley noted that staff is looking to continue collaborating with Professor Radwan in the future. He also recognized outgoing committee chairs Mr. Tom O'Hanlon, Ms. Mary Moskowitz and Ms. Joedel Zaballero and reported the new Chairs would be Mr. Atlee Mercer, CAC, Mr. Kelly Brock, TSMO, and Mr. Hazem El-Assar, TAC. Mr. Barley called attention to the 2018 MPOAC Institute scheduled for April in Orlando and June in Tampa and encouraged board members who had not yet attended to attend. He called upon Ms. Virginia Whittington who provided a brief legislative update. Ms. Whittington reported that House Bill 535 (Statewide Alternative Transportation Bill) had been filed by Representative Avila to redesignate the Rail Enterprise and rename the entity within FDOT the Statewide Alternative Transportation Authority. She added that of the \$60 million that would normally be allocated to the agency, the bill proposes that \$25 million of those funds would be going to TBARTA and \$25 million possibly going to Miami Dade, with only \$10 million in funding left for the rest of the state. Ms. Whittington noted that three bills had been submitted that dealt with caps on MPO boards. One, she reported, would set a minimum of five board members, with no cap, and another would set a minimum of five board members and a maximum of fifteen. These bills, she added, would require additional work on them before they could move forward. Ms. Whittington reported that legislation regarding texting while driving had gained significant traction and looked more viable than in the past. Mr. Barley added that the annual Holiday Reception was being held December 14<sup>th</sup> from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. and included a toy drive to benefit Help Now of Osceola. Commissioner Grieb spoke briefly about the Help Now of Osceola organization. Mr. Barley noted that Mr. Adam Lovejoy, FDOT staff, had accepted a position with the St. Johns Water Management District.

#### IV. CONFIRMATION OF QUORUM

Ms. Cathy Goldfarb confirmed a quorum of 17 voting members present. Also present were 4 advisors; and the meeting having been duly convened was ready to proceed with business.

#### V. AGENDA REVIEW

Mr. Barley reported that under agenda item VIII. E. the contribution to the UCF Foundation would be \$5,000.

#### VI. COMMITTEE REPORTS

No MAC representative was in attendance.

Mr. Tom O'Hanlon reported that Community Advisory Committee members met on November 29, 2017. He told Board members that it had been a pleasure to serve as CAC chairman for the past two years, and to represent the Committee on the MetroPlan Orlando Board. Mr. O'Hanlon added that Officer Elections were held and Mr. Atlee Mercer from Osceola County was elected Chairman and Ms. Sarah Elbadri from City of Orlando was elected Vice Chairman for 2018. In addition, CAC members approved a revision to the CAC bylaws, which creates a process for MetroPlan Orlando appointees to use alternates. The revised bylaws were on the consent agenda for ratification under item VIII.I. Committee members also recommended approval of the amendments to the Transportation Improvement Program. He noted that a New Member Application Review Subcommittee was formed and will meet in January to review applications and make recommendations on new members. These recommendations will be presented for approval at the February 14 Board meeting. CAC members also received presentations on the 2040 Long Range Transportation Plan, Wekiva Parkway project, and an update on LYNX activities.

Ms. Mary Moskowitz reported that Technical Advisory Committee members met on December 1, 2017 and recommended approval of the TIP amendments. She added TAC Officer elections were held and Mr. Hazem El-Assar from Orange County was elected Chairman and Mr. Frank Consoli from Seminole County was elected Vice-Chairman for 2018. TAC members, she noted, also selected representatives to serve on a Transportation Performance Measures Working Group.

Ms. Joedel Zaballero reported that the Transportation Systems Management & Operations Committee met on December 1, 2017 and approved the October 27, 2017 meeting minutes and amendments to the FY 2017/18 - 2021/22 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) which included new funding for three TSMO projects, five railroad crossing projects, and improvements to CR 427/Ronald Reagan Blvd. in Longwood. TSMO Officer Elections for 2018 were held and Mr. Kelly Brock, City of Casselberry, was elected the new Chair; and Mr. Benton Bonney, City of Orlando, was elected the new Vice Chair. Lastly, she reported, Mr. Bryan

Homayouni, CFX provided a presentation on the agency's preparation for Connected/Automated Vehicles.

Mr. Barley reported that MAC members had approved all their action items at their December 7<sup>th</sup> meeting, including those action items going to the Board.

#### XI. OTHER BUSINESS

#### A. Wekiva Parkway Progress Report

Ms. Mary Brooks, Quest Corporation of America, Inc., gave a presentation on the current status of the Wekiva Parkway project Ms. Brooks provided background information on the 25-mile, \$1.6 billion project, which will complete the beltway around the Orlando area. She noted that the project included all electronic tolling and there will be non-tolled roads running parallel for local access. Ms. Brooks reviewed the sections of the Wekiva Parkway project, which agency was responsible and the status of the sections. In addition, she provided a video showing the construction process for one of the bridges included in the project. She detailed efforts to protect wildlife in the area and aesthetics that would be included. Ms. Brooks offered to provide presentations on the Wekiva Parkway to other interested groups and constituents. Mayor Kilsheimer commented on the positive economic impact the project is having in Apopka. Commissioner Constantine commented on the length of time the project has been in the works and how proud he is to have it come to fruition, something which would not have been possible without regional cooperation.

#### B. LYNX Update

Mr. Edward Johnson, CEO of LYNX, gave a presentation on the latest LYNX activities that are underway. Mr. Johnson outlined the five areas of emphasis for 2017 which were to enhance communications, improve service efficiency, establish more partnerships, improve customer confidence in the system and increase brand recognition and community involvement. Investment funds, he noted, have experienced a significant increase and are expected to increase more in 2018 and health care changes have resulted in cost savings as well. He called attention to major corridors which have remained the same in the 2011 LYNX 2030 Vision Plan as they had since 1989. Mr. Johnson provided information on the LYNX Forward Transit Development Plan and Route

Optimization Study, as well as the Mobility Management Plan for paratransit. He detailed new technology that LYNX has developed including the bus tracker app, mobile NeighborLink app, and mobile payment option. LYNX, he noted, is looking to form additional community partnerships in the future. Mr. Johnson also reviewed LYNX's goals for 2018. Commissioner VanderLey commented on a concern a constituent had regarding a change in the way they needed to schedule their paratransit trips. Mr. Johnson responded that he would take the constituent's information from Commissioner VanderLey and look into the concern. Board members commented on their positive experiences with LYNX and LYNX's efforts in regards to helping the community.

#### C. Overview of the USDOT Grant under the Advanced Transportation and Congestion Management Technologies Deployment Initiative awarded to FDOT, MetroPlan Orlando and the University of Central Florida

Mr. Eric Hill introduced Mr. Jeremy Dilmore, FDOT, who gave an overview of the \$11.9 million federal grant recently received by Central Florida to advance several intelligent transportation system technologies. Mr. Dilmore reported that the grant was a collaborative effort between FDOT, MetroPlan Orlando and the University of Central Florida. He reviewed the four main components of the grant which included SunStore, which exists currently, PedSafe, Green Way and Smart Community and the challenges they were addressing. Mr. Dilmore called attention to two areas of focus which would be the Pine Hills area and the University of Central Florida. UCF, he noted, provided the opportunity to test the components in an area that was a community in itself. Mr. Dilmore reported that the timetable for the project would be 2017 to 2021 and post grant issues such as operations and maintenance would need to be considered.

Essam Radwan served as the Executive Director of the Center for Advanced Transportation Systems Simulation (CATSS) till November 1, 2017 before retirement from UCF. He received a BS degree in Civil Engineering with honors from Cairo University, Egypt and MS and Ph.D. Degrees from Purdue University. In 1978, he started his teaching career at Virginia Tech where he was tenured and promoted to Associate Professor then he moved to Arizona State University in 1984 and was promoted to full professor in 1990. Through a national search he was recruited to UCF to chair the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering and he remained in that position till 2003. In 1998 he was appointed to be the founding Director of the federally established transportation center (CATSS).

Professor Radwan research interest is traffic characteristics and traffic signal control of freeway and street intersections. Included in this area are theoretical and applied models, discrete event simulation models, and large-scale databases developed to describe traffic behavior. He was instrumental in bridging the gap between human factors researchers, computer engineers, and transportation engineers. The "Human Centered Transportation Simulation Program" that he created under CATSS auspices has been viewed as a unique and one of the leading programs in the US. He directed and co-directed over 80 research projects totaling close to \$15 million in external funded research projects. Through research and graduate advising he published more than two hundred and fifty (250) technical papers and reports and his work has been extensively cited by his peers in the US and around the world. Professor Radwan delivered close to hundred presentations at international conferences and professional meetings. He was a keynote speaker for

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meetings held in countries like Brazil, China, Qatar, Kuwait, United Arab Emirates, New Zealand, Australia, Lebanon, Turkey, Singapore, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, and France.

Professor Radwan graduated twenty (22) Ph.D. students, thirty-three (38) master degree students. Academic institutions, consulting firms, and public agencies in different states like Florida, Virginia, Louisiana, Colorado, Massachusetts, and Tennessee and overseas countries like Brazil, Egypt, and United Arab Emirates employ his past students.

One of his major accomplishments is building the real time simulation laboratory that involved researchers at UCF from electrical and computer engineering, civil and environmental engineering, industrial engineering, psychology and human factors, and Institute for Simulation and Training. External funded research from FDOT and Georgia Tech Research Foundation sponsored the dual-cab motion base-driving simulator. This program has attracted international experts in this field to visit CATSS labs during the third Driving Simulators Conference hosted by CATSS and held in Orlando in November 2005.

Professor Radwan service to the profession has been extensive. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers and the Institute of Transportation Engineers and has been an active member with the Transportation Research Board, the Florida Engineering Society, and the Intelligent Transportation Systems of Florida. 





# **Section 10: Noteworthy Practices & Achievements**

## Use of Mobile Device Tracking Data for informed decision making

MetroPlan Orlando purchased two months (April 2014 and April 2015) of mobile device tracking data (MDTD) for all the Traffic Analysis Zones (TAZs) within the region from AirSage. This dataset was then made accessible to the MetroPlan staff and partners through the business intelligence tool, Tableau. This effort enabled us to assist several of our partners by providing valuable insight on travel patterns within our region at the TAZ level. Examples –

a. LYNX used this data in their ongoing SR 436 transit study by helping decipher the trip interactions within the corridor from Orlando International Airport. The analysis also provided more insight into which TAZs along the corridor were more likely to produce potential riders.

b. We provided Florida's Turnpike Enterprise with a sub-regional trip matrix in order to help them determine the major travel sheds for their agency. They also used this data to determine different O-D pair exchanges and to cross check the trip matrices produced by Bluetooth data on some of their corridors.

# 2. Safety Initiatives

Safety has always been a priority for the MetroPlan Orlando Board and last year's emphasis on safety was strengthened by our involvement in the Safe Routes to School grant offered by FDOT. MetroPlan Orlando has also been actively engaged in the Student/Pedestrian Safety Committee (SPSC) that meets monthly in Orange County. The SPSC committee includes members from Orange County Public Works, the City of Orlando and the City of Winter Park, the Orange County Sheriff's Department, FDOT and Orange County Public Schools. The committee talks about the sidewalk needs within the county with special focus on Orange County Public Schools and prioritizes the sidewalk improvements that are identified. In addition, MetroPlan Orlando continues to provide funding to the Best Foot Forward program that is operated by Bike/Walk Central Florida. This year the program is expanding into Osceola and Seminole Counties.

## 3. Regional Model Development – Partner engagement

MetroPlan Orlando utilized the crowdsourcing capabilities available through ArcGIS online in order to solicit feedback from our local partners on the existing Traffic Analysis Zone boundaries as well as the transportation network within the regional transportation model. This online feature made it easier for our local jurisdiction partners to go through the entire transportation network at their convenience before we convened to meet one on one with them for further information. This also ensured thorough vetting of the process by our local jurisdiction partners making them feel more engaged in the whole model development process.



## 4. Project Advancement & SU Fund Management

MetroPlan Orlando has been working closely with Department staff to maximize the cost effectiveness of the available State and Federal funds by partnering on various types of projects to incorporate multimodal elements into 3-R projects or TSMO projects into other projects underway. Over the Calendar Year of 2017, MetroPlan partnered with FDOT on Kirkman Road in Orange County, US 17/92 at Airport Road in Seminole County and Hoagland Boulevard in Osceola County to include projects identified on the Project Priority List into FDOT managed projects in the Work Program. Additionally MetroPlan has been able to make significant advances of the Project Priority List by programing 19 other projects from the Highway, TSMO and Bicycle / Pedestrian list.

## 5. Corinne Drive Complete Streets Study

The Corrine Drive Complete Streets Study is a pilot for multiple things—a test of MetroPlan Orlando's Complete Streets policy and how the agency can incorporate health considerations into the transportation planning process. MetroPlan Orlando used two guides to inform the study scope, health data sources, and health-related stakeholders. FHWA's Health in Transportation Corridor Planning Framework and the ULI's Building Healthy Corridors Audit Tool provided the structure needed for incorporating health data. The health department assisted MetroPlan Orlando with identifying several possible data sources. The 500 Cities project, a collaboration between the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and the CDC Foundation, provided health data at the Census tract level. The data is reported using statistically modeled, Small Area Estimates from the 2014 Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey data.

The health department collected air quality data on behalf of MetroPlan Orlando. Two health department staff members conducted air quality readings at several of the study's traffic count locations. The tests were done at the edge of the road (existing curb), several feet back (where a potential sidewalk would be), and at the entrance to restaurants (where outdoor seating is located). These locations were chosen based on where people might be gathered. The air quality test allowed MetroPlan Orlando to identify if people would be negatively affected by vehicle emissions depending where they might be-- walking on the sidewalk or eating outside at a restaurant.

Additionally, transportation data collection methods and field observations were combined with the 500 Cities and air quality data to build a Health Profile for the study area and its 15,000 residents. The profile includes a qualitative and quantitative assessment. It can be found here: https://metroplanorlando.org/wp-content/uploads/Health-Profile.pdf

## 6. Public Health Initiatives

In 2017 MetroPlan Orlando continued its Health and Transportation leadership. Staff presented at 8 external events, including but not limited to the Osceola County's Health Equity Summit, Leadership Orlando, the Association of Metropolitan Planning Organization's annual events, and Transplex. MetroPlan Orlando staff is a member of Orange County's Community Health Improvement Board, a recently formed cross sector coalition to address the Social Determinants of Health. Additionally, MetroPlan Orlando has taken responsibility within the Orange County's Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) for implementing transportation strategies, such as Complete Streets that increase opportunities for healthy behaviors. MetroPlan Orlando's leadership at the local,



state, and national level demonstrates how our transportation system is crucial for supporting public health, increasing economic opportunity, and enhancing quality of life.

7. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Invest Tool

MetroPlan Orlando starts development of its next long range plan for Orange, Osceola, and Seminole counties in late 2018. It will be adopted in December 2020. A lot has changed since the last plan was developed. The Federal Highway Administration created a tool to help regional transportation planners incorporate health and sustainability principles into their long range planning process. MetroPlan Orlando was awarded a grant to explore how this tool could be used in Central Florida. In 2017 MetroPlan developed the program for our summit "Transportation Think In: Making 2045 Healthy, Sustainable and Resilient", designed to solicit a broad array of many community sectors here in MetroPlan that historically do not participate in Long Range Planning activities. This summit is supported with these grant funds. A white paper and series of strategy reports will follow the summit and shape updates to MetroPlan Orlando's future work.

## 8. Advances in Transit

MetroPlan Orlando serves on the Technical Advisory Panel for LYNX's Transit Development Plan Major Update and Route Optimization Study. This significant effort is reimagining the Lynx system. Staff are participating in the SR 436 Transit Study, the SR 436 Health Impact Assessment, and regional automated transit efforts. As highlighted above, MetroPlan provided Mobile Device Tracking Data to identify travel characteristics within the corridor and how the region interacts with the SR 436 Corridor.

9. New Website Completes Its First Year – We launched a new website in January 2017. Overall, we have exceeded the objective for website usage. Our original objective in our website plan was to, within a year, attain a 15% increase in visitors over previous year. When comparing Jan.-Nov. 2017 to Jan.-Nov. 2016, site users increased 29% -- nearly double our objective! Almost 17,000 people had visited our website by end of November.

10. MetroPlan Orlando Annual Report - This past summer, MetroPlan Orlando released the 20th anniversary edition of our annual report, called 20 Years of Leadership. The publication, which was published in hard copy and digitally on our website, was a fun, fresh take on transportation planning. It reflected on how far we've come since becoming an independent organization 20 years ago and also looked forward to where our next 20 years will lead us. The project included a timeline of important transportation milestones throughout Central Florida's history and MetroPlan Orlando's history as an organization. This year, for the first time, we also created an expanded digital timeline on our website to supplement our annual report.

11. New Strategies for Student Outreach – In December 2017, MetroPlan Orlando piloted a new, high tech outreach strategy for engaging students in the transportation planning process. The test took place at the 2017 Central Florida Scouting Jamboree put on by the Central Florida Council of Boy Scouts of America. This event welcomed more than 2,000 Boy Scouts and their families from throughout the region to Osceola Heritage Park in Kissimmee for a variety of recreation and learning activities. MetroPlan Orlando



set up a table in the Indoor STEM area of the Jamboree, where we offered the kids and their parents a chance to experiment with StreetMix, an online tool used by professional transportation planners. Using iPads with the StreetMix website, we challenged participants to start with an empty street and add features that they thought would help drivers, cyclists and pedestrians have safer and more enjoyable trips on the street. During the day, we coached about 50 kids through a 10-minute process of street planning. We also had prepared sheets on how to use StreetMix and basics of Complete Street planning. Kids who ran out of time, didn't want to make a full stop at the table, or wanted to experiment more were told how to use the tool at home. Overall, this was a very successful strategy with school-aged children, which we will definitely use again. Photos from this event will be seen here:

12. Public Engagement for the Corrine Drive Complete Streets Study – MetroPlan Orlando has conducted a thorough public involvement process for the Corrine Drive Complete Streets Study. This project is particularly challenging because it involves three local governments and a very engaged community with various ideas of what should happen to Corrine Drive. Noteworthy outreach practices and achievements for this study include:

• A comprehensive Public Involvement Plan for the study was created, laying the foundation for inclusive two-way communication with the community. See the project PIP here: https://metroplanorlando.org/wp-content/uploads/Corrine-Dr-Public-Involvement-Plan-FINAL-3-15-17.pdf

• A survey was conducted in phase one of the study to learn about the community's concerns and desires for Corrine Drive. We received phenomenal participation, with a total of 1,705 survey responses. Our 11-question survey was available online from mid-March through May 30. We also distributed paper versions when needed. The survey was promoted through social media, Next Door neighborhood app, email, sample mailings and events. Staff conducted all survey analysis in-house and authored the survey report, which can be found here: https://metroplanorlando.org/wp-content/uploads/Corrine-Drive-Study-Survey-Report-FINAL.pdf

• During phase one, we supplemented the survey with extensive outreach in the community. Staff attended 13 events, including presentations to community groups and setting up booths at events. We encouraged people to take the survey in the field on iPads.

• In July 2017, MetroPlan Orlando held a workshop to wrap up phase one of the study, where we shared technical data about existing conditions on Corrine Drive and shared survey results with the community. The workshop was a huge success, with about 150 attendees.

• To aid in visualization for the workshop, we created an introduction video that attendees watched upon arrival. The video outlined what attendees could learn at each



station and showcased the pride the community felt for the neighborhood. This video will also serve as the foundation for what will be a mini-documentary about the study. The video was very well received and posted to MetroPlan Orlando's YouTube channel for use after the workshop.

13. Encouraging Use of Transit with TransitScreen – In May 2017, MetroPlan Orlando had a ribbon-cutting in its office for Central Florida's first installation of TransitScreen, a type of civic technology that shares up-to-date information about the five different transportation options around our downtown location. Visitors to the MetroPlan Orlando office now have access to a simple, singular display of real-time travel information in the lobby. More info here: https://metroplanorlando.org/transportationnews/metroplan-orlando-host-to-central-floridas-first-transitscreen/

14. The ITS Master Plan - The ITS Master Plan was initiated to formulate an implementation strategy for future deployment and maintenance. The Master Plan was approved by the MetroPlan Orlando Board in May 2017. The Master Plan includes: an ITS vision, goals and objectives; an inventory of existing conditions/infrastructure; a needs assessment; an identification of applicable ITS strategies; a review and update of the Regional ITS Architecture (RITSA); a concept of operations; and the ITS project scoring criteria and the ranking of future ITS projects. All ITS projects identified in the LRTP and 34 potential projects were scored and ranked (prioritized) through the application of the scoring criteria. Depending on the project, the implementation timeline for each project is 0 to 5 years or 6 to 10 years.

15. FHWA/SHRP2 Grant Award - MetroPlan Orlando received an FHWA Strategic Highway Research Program (SHRP2) grant to pilot the use of the Work Zone Impacts and Strategies Estimator (WISE) Software. WISE can evaluate the impacts of various highway renewal strategies on a given network. Strategies using such means as day or night operations, innovative contracting, advanced maintenance of traffic plans, and public information programs can be evaluated. WISE can aid decision making by assessing reconstruction activity sequencing given limited resources and other constraints. MetroPlan Orlando partnered with the University of Central Florida and Calipers Corporation to complete this study. An evaluation of the original WISE software components and methods revealed concerns with both the method used to determine delay and with the use of the software itself. The evaluation revealed the need to completely reformulate both the software and underpinning methods of WISE. The result is a completely re-designed and re-formulated tool. The new application achieves the original goal of creating a user-friendly tool that allows State DOT and MPO users to evaluate different project schedules and strategies to achieve minimum travel delays and construction costs.

16. Traffic Signal Timing - MetroPlan Orlando has successfully coordinated and managed the traffic signal retiming program, along with the before and after studies to show the value of this effort. This is not typically handled by an MPO but MetroPlan Orlando was glad to take on this responsibility since it is such an important part of our TSMO-related work.



17. FHWA/ATCMTD Grant Award - After not receiving an award for an application to the 2016 FHWA Advance Transportation and Congestion Management Technologies Deployment (ATCMTD) Initiative Grant, staff partnered with the FDOT and UCF to submit another application. The application received a grant award of \$11.9 million and includes four projects. PedSafe will digitally connect vehicles, people and traffic lights to develop a pedestrian and bicycle collision avoidance system. GreenWay will use sensors and new traffic signal technology to help the transportation system quickly adapt to real-time traffic conditions. Smart Community will combine information from many different transportation options into one place so people have a one-stop shop to plan their trips. Sun Store will be the FDOT's central data storage for all of the TSMO information.

18. LiDAR Scanning Technology - Through its TSMO Committee, MetroPlan Orlando sustained support for and investment in innovative technology solutions. This includes successful testing of LiDAR scanning, a new survey technology for use in traffic homicide investigations that also reduces the resources, time and impact on traffic during an investigation. This demonstration, which included a financial contribution from MetroPlan Orlando, is being conducted in partnership with CFX, FDOT, City of Orlando Police Department and the Florida Highway Patrol.

19. Connected and Autonomous Vehicles - MetroPlan Orlando is actively working with stakeholders to coordinate and manage local efforts to integrate Connected and Autonomous Vehicle (C/AV) technologies in the transportation network. Staff is a member of the Association of MPOs C/AV Work Group. The objective of the work group is to:

• Provide a mechanism to build technical, institutional, and policy capacity of MPOs with their partner state and local agencies to leverage the benefits of deployment of connected and automated vehicle technology to the performance based planning and programming process.

• Address knowledge gaps and provide a forum for MPOs with their partner state and local agencies engaged in transportation planning to educate and expand awareness of the nature and status of C/AV deployment, and of current and emerging technical planning issues, institutional and policy challenges.

• Support the U. S. DOT outreach and engagement by providing a mechanism for support and feedback on planning-related guidance, research, and training and technical assistance needs associated with deployment of connected and automated vehicle technology.

20. Staff is working with the TSMO Committee to convene a workshop to address the challenge of developing a transportation ecosystem that welcomes CAV and other emerging technologies. It will determine how prepared MetroPlan Orlando is for integration of CAVs and infrastructure, intuitional and community readiness. Staff is also working with LYNX and the City of Orlando on an Autonomous Vehicle Mobility Initiative (AVMI) to research, plan, design and implement autonomous transit vehicle technology.

The Department will continue to work with local agencies and the MPO on LAP certification to get projects delivered. The MPO feels the LAP process is overwhelming for the local agencies.





I took an interest in city planning and transportation after my first work trip to London. As someone who is easily stressed and depressed by the normal auto commute, I was blown away by how different the experience of navigating a city by walking and public transportation can be. I felt invigorated and encountered so many more people throughout my day instead of boxing myself inside my car to and from work. When I returned to Orlando, I wanted to implement the way of life that I experienced in cities like London and Amsterdam, but I quickly realized it was simply impossible. The joy I experienced in Europe was eclipsed by my reality of a lonely commute witnessing all the roadkill on either side of 417 each day.

Instead of complaining about the situation, I decided to become more educated on how and why things are this way. I wanted to understand what brought us to this point, as one of the most dangerous areas for pedestrians in the United States. I began reading books on city planning, the history of transportation, our addiction to the auto industry, and activist movements in other major cities geared toward pedestrian and cyclist safety. I attended several workshops, including the Citizen Planner Academy and the Sustainability Summits. I learned how something as inexpensive as painting bike lanes at conflict points could save so many lives, just by making drivers more aware. I know that simple solutions to our problems exist, and are not far from reach.

For me, traffic is inconvenient and lonely. However for some it is simply not an option. This became apparent to me when my sister, an epileptic, lost her license in 2015. After a string of seizures made her dangerous behind the wheel, I was opened to the world of the disabled and disadvantaged, and how difficult our current transportation system makes life for them. Getting to her doctor's appointments is a 30-minute drive, or a two-hour bus ride. Forget walking or riding her bike, it's simply not feasible due to high traffic volume roadways with little to no pedestrian/bicyclist facilities. She has completely lost her self-confidence now that she must rely on others for means of transportation. It's heartbreaking to see her quality of life reduced here, knowing that in a higher density area she might thrive.

When I learned Central Florida was considering road diets for areas near my home, I jumped on the opportunity to get involved. Orlando is my home, and I don't want to move to other cities that have their transportation figured out, I want to bring those tools and resources that have proven successful to our city to improve the lives of residents here. I started attending the MetroPlan meetings for Corrine Dr. and it has been rewarding to be a part of the process, even if it is just one voice. I think volunteering as a CAC member would be incredibly fulfilling and provide me with the opportunity to directly contribute to my community. I've already shared my passion with everyone around me, but having a platform such as this committee to stand on and bring valuable, useful, and relevant information to my peers would give me a great sense of purpose.



## JOINT METROPOLITAN PLANNING AGREEMENT BETWEEN LAKE-SUMTER MPO AND METROPLAN ORLANDO,

THIS JOINT METROPOLITAN PLANNING AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), entered on the date indicated below, is by and between the Lake-Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization ("Lake-Sumter MPO") and MetroPlan Orlando, a transportation planning organization ("MetroPlan"), hereinafter collectively referred to as "the parties".

#### WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Lake-Sumter MPO and MetroPlan are metropolitan planning organizations established by Section 339.175, Florida Statutes for the purpose of encouraging and promoting the safe and efficient management, operation and development of surface transportations systems; and

WHEREAS, the Lake-Sumter MPO and MetroPlan serve a joint metropolitan planning area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 CFR § 450.314, the parties desire to enter into a joint metropolitan planning agreement to formalize their continued cooperation together to address the transportation needs in those areas where they share boundaries.

**NOW THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION** of the mutual terms, understandings, and conditions, hereinafter set forth, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. <u>Recitals</u>. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by this reference.

2. **Purpose**. The purpose of this Agreement is formalize the agreement between the parties to continue to cooperate in carrying out the metropolitan transportation planning process. The Lake-Sumter MPO and MetroPlan enter into this Agreement to set forth the obligations and responsibilities so as to best manage the interconnections. The purpose of the Agreement is not to be an approval of a merger of the individual parties into a single metropolitan planning organization.

3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Agreement shall become effective upon the date the last party hereto executes it ("Effective Date").

4. **Obligation and Responsibilities**. The Lake-Sumter MPO and MetroPlan agree to the following:

- A. The parties will cooperatively develop and share information related to transportation performance data; and
- B. The parties will provide each other with information on proposed alignments or transportation improvements that will impact the area in which the parties share boundaries; and

- C. The parties will coordinate to assure the development of consistent metropolitan transportation plans and five-year Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs) with respect to that transportation improvement; and
- D. The parties will cooperate on the selection of performance targets and the reporting of performance targets; and
- E. The parties will cooperate on the reporting of performance to be used in tracking progress toward attainment of critical outcomes for the region; and
- F. The parties will cooperate on the collection of data for the State asset management plans for the National Highway System (NHS) for each of the following circumstances: When one Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) serves an Urbanized Area (UZA), when more than one MPO serves an UZA, and when a Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) includes an UZA that has been designated as a Transportation Management Area (TMA) as well as a UZA that is not a TMA; and
- G. The parties will keep each other informed of changes and other information in a spirit of continuing cooperation.
- H. The parties agree that these coordination efforts and outcomes shall be documented in subsequent transmittals of the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and other planning products, including the metropolitan transportation plan and TIP, to the State, the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Transit Administration.

5. <u>Term and Termination</u>. This Agreement shall become effective upon the Effective Date and shall remain in effect until terminated by the parties. A party seeking to terminate this Agreement must provide written notice to the other party. Upon receipt of the notice of intent to terminate, the parties will enter a written termination agreement memorializing the responsibilities to be provided after the date of termination.

6. <u>Modifications</u>. No modification, amendment, or alteration of the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document executed by the parties, with the same formality and of equal dignity herewith.

7. **Entire Agreement**. This document embodies the entire agreement between the parties. It may not be modified or terminated except as provided herein.

8. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, it shall be considered deleted here from, and shall not invalidate the remaining provisions.

JOINT METROPOLITAN PLANNING AGREEMENT BETWEEN LAKE-SUMTER MPO AND METROPLAN ORLANDO

9. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts each of which, when executed and delivered, shall be an original, but all counterparts shall together constitute one and the same instrument.

10. <u>Additional Agreements</u>. In addition to this Agreement, additional agreements may be or may have been executed between the Lake~Sumter MPO and MetroPlan, including but not limited to the interlocal agreement constituting the Central Florida MPO Alliance, of which both the Lake~Sumter MPO and MetroPlan Orlando are parties along with, the River to Sea TPO, the Space Coast TPO, Ocala/Marion County Transportation Planning Organization, and the Polk TPO.

**IN WITNESS WHEREOF**, the parties hereto have made and executed this Agreement on the respective dates under each signature, each party by and through its authorized representative.



The start of the new year calls attention to new opportunities. One such opportunity is another chance to secure federal funding for the construction of SunRail Phase 2-North. This would allow us to complete the 61-mile project which has been a regional priority for more than a decade.

Given the project phase's financials, traditional FTA new starts funding does not look promising – nor does a TIGER grant, especially with the Administration proposing the elimination of these grants. However, there are other possibilities for federal funds in either Washington or Tallahassee.

We need to be prepared to take advantage of these opportunities. This will require that we show the project has strong local and regional support. Some of what has played out over the past year has resulted in a mixed message. This must be overcome if we are going to get the job done.

I recommend we start gathering resolutions and letters of support that could be hand-delivered to FDOT in Tallahassee by a delegation of regional leaders. This would send a clear message about our commitment to complete the 61-mile project.

Enclosed is a starter list. You will probably want to add the names of additional organizations and individuals. Once the list is complete, responsibilities for obtaining expressions of support can be divided among the three of us.

I welcome any thoughts you have on this project.

## **Funding Principles**

- I. Infrastructure Incentives Initiative: encourages state, local and private investment in core infrastructure by providing incentives in the form of grants. Federal incentive funds will be conditioned on achieving milestones within an identified timeframe. Accounts for 50% of total appropriation.
  - A. Applies to: surface transportation, airports, passenger rail, maritime and inland waterway ports, flood control, water supply, hydropower, water resources, drinking water facilities, storm water facilities, Brownfield and Superfund sites
  - B. Eligible entities: States or groups of states, Puerto Rico, U.S. territories, metropolitan planning organizations, units of local government or a group of local governments, special purpose district or public authority responsible for maintaining infrastructure facilities, public utilities, non-profits, tribal governments, multijurisdictional group of eligible entities, private entities with sponsorship from an eligible public entity.
  - C. Core infrastructure projects are eligible. The lead federal agency administering the initiative will define eligible costs and conduct audits to ensure funds are used appropriately.
  - D. The lead federal agency will solicit applications every 6 months. Criteria includes:
    - 1. Dollar value of project (weighted at 10%)
    - 2. Evidence supporting how applicant will secure and commit new, non-federal revenue to create sustainable, long-term funding (weighted at 50%)
    - 3. Evidence supporting how applicant will secure and commit new, non-federal revenue for operations, maintenance and rehabilitation (weighted at 20%)
    - 4. Updates to procurement policies and project delivery approaches to improve efficiency in project delivery and operations (weighted at 10%)
    - 5. Plans to incorporate new technology (weighted at 5%)
    - 6. Evidence to support how project will spur economic and social returns on investment (weighted at 5%)
      - a. Calculated by multiplying the weighted score by the percentage of nonfederal revenues used to fund the project
      - b. Lookback period:

- E. Grant awards can't exceed 20% of total project cost. Any individual state can't receive more than 10% of the amount available
- II. Transformative Projects Program: makes available federal funding and technical assistance for innovative and transformative infrastructure projects based on competitive basis to viable projects unable to secure financing through private sector due to the uniqueness of the program. Applicable projects must be exploratory and ground-breaking ideas that have more risk than

standard infrastructure projects but offer a larger reward profile. Covered sectors include: transportation, clean water, drinking water, energy, commercial space, and telecommunications. *Accounts for 10% of total appropriation*.

- A. Dept. of Commerce chairs administration of the program.
- B. Eligible entities: States or groups of states, Puerto Rico, U.S. territories, metropolitan planning organizations, units of local government or a group of local governments, special purpose district or public authority responsible for maintaining infrastructure facilities, public utilities, non-profits, tribal governments, multijurisdictional group of eligible entities, private entities with sponsorship from an eligible public entity.
- C. Funding tracks: Applicants could apply for all or specific tracks.
  - 1. Demonstration: funding provided for planning, construction, deployment and evaluation of demonstration trials. Can't be used for applied R&D activities but instead where a prototype is operated at or near full scale. *Federal funding may be used for up to 30% of eligible costs.*
  - 2. Project Planning: funding provided for final pre-construction activities i.e. final design and engineering. Demonstration trial must have occurred and been successful. Must demonstrate construction would begin within a reasonable time frame. *Federal funding may be used for up to 50% of eligible costs.*
  - 3. Capitol Construction: funding provided for capital projects having independent utility and ready for intended use upon completion. *Federal funding may be used for up to 80% of eligible costs.* 
    - a. Under this track, applicant required to enter into a financial partnership agreement with the Federal Government requiring that if a project begins to generate value, the Federal Government would have rights to share in the project value. The Federal Government would not assert first claim under any such agreement, would not accept a seat on any company's board of directors, and all partnership agreements would provide that the company retains ownership of any and all intellectual property.
- D. Minimum match requirements in the form of equity investments by private or nonprofit organizations. Applicant must demonstrate equity is committed and available.
- E. Federal technical assistance available in addition to funding tracks, but no funding provided.
- F. Dept. of Commerce would administer the program with an interagency selection committee. A notice of funding opportunity would be published in the federal register soliciting applications on an annual basis. Cost benefit analysis is required and applications are limited to one per lead applicant, although there would be no limit to the number of applications on which an applicant could be listed as a partner applicant.
- G. Applicants selected would enter into a partnership agreement with the Federal Government which would specify terms and would not exceed 7 years to outlay funds. Milestones and schedules included in the agreement, the progress for which the lead Federal agencies would conduct regular audits.
- III. Rural Infrastructure Program: designed to encourage investment to enable rural economies, facilitate freight movement, improve access to reliable and affordable transportation, etc. States are incentivized to partner with local and private investment for completion and operation of projects under this program. Accounts for 25% of total appropriation.
  - A. Eligible entities rural programs include:

- 1. Transportation roads, bridges, public transit, rail airports, and maritime and inland waterway ports;
- 2. Broadband and other high-speed data and communication conduits;
- 3. Water and waste drinking water, waste water, land revitalization, and Brownfields;
- 4. Power and electric governmental generation, transmission and distribution facilities; and
- 5. Water resources inland waterway ports, flood risk management, maritime ports and water supply.
- B. Funding:
  - 1. 80% of funds made available for states would be provided to the Governor of each state via the following formula:
    - a. Ratio based on total rural lane miles in a state in relation to total rural lane miles in all states and a ratio based on the total adjusted rural population of a State in relation to the total adjusted rural population of all states.
  - 2. 20% reserved for rural performance grants
    - a. States encouraged to do so within 2 years of enactment
    - b. Grants available for up to 10 years after enactment or until funds run out.
    - c. To qualify, states must publish a comprehensive rural infrastructure investment plan (RIIP) within 180 days of receipt of formula funds.
  - 3. Funds made available would be distributed as block grants without Federal requirements, but must be used for projects in rural areas with a population of less than 50,000.
  - 4. Provides investment designed to address infrastructure needs on tribal lands and U.S. Territories.
- IV. Federal Credit Programs: designed to increase the capacity of existing Federal lending programs to increase investment. *Accounts for 7.05% of total appropriation*.
  - A. Would establish the (1) Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act, (2) Railroad Rehabilitation and Improvement Financing, (3) Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act, and (4) United States Department of Agriculture Rural Utilities Lending Programs under which specific funds would be set aside and appropriated to the relevant U.S. agency and would remain available until 2028.
- V. Public Lands Infrastructure Fund: would create a new infrastructure fund in the U.S. Treasury called the Interior Maintenance Fund comprised of additional revenues from the amounts due and payable to the U.S. from mineral and energy development on Federal lands and waters.
- VI. Disposition of Federal Real Property: would establish through executive order the authority to allow for the disposal of Federal assets to improve the overall allocation of economic resources in infrastructure investment.
- VII. Federal Capital Financing Fund: creates a funding mechanism similar to a capital budget but that operates within the traditional rules used for the Federal budget by establishing a mandatory revolving fund to finance purchases of federally owned civilian real property. Once approved in an Appropriations Act, the revolving fund would transfer money to agencies to finance large-dollar real property purchases. Purchasing agencies would then be required to repay the fund in 15 equal annual amounts using discretionary appropriations. *Accounts for 5% of total appropriation*.

- VIII. Private Activity Bonds: would amend 26 U.S.C. 142 to allow broader categories of publicpurpose infrastructure, including reconstruction projects, to take advantage of PABs would encourage more private investment in projects to benefit the public.
  - A. Elimination of the AMT provision and the Advance Refunding prohibition on PABs
  - B. Elimination of the transportation volume caps on PABs and expend eligibility to ports and airports
  - C. Removal of state volume cap on PABs
  - D. Provide change-of-use provisions to preserve the tax exempt status of governmental bonds
  - E. Require public attributes for core public infrastructure projects
  - F. Provide change-of-use cures for private leasing of projects to ensure preservation of tax exemption for core infrastructure bonds

## Brightline Achieves Another Major Milestone with Final Environmental Approval by U.S. DOT

MIAMI – December 15, 2017 – Today, the U.S. Department of Transportation issued a Record of Decision for the privately funded Brightline intercity passenger rail project between Miami and Orlando. The Record of Decision (ROD) represents the final step in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process after the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) was issued in 2015 and is the last federal environmental approval needed to construct the system between West Palm Beach and Orlando. This decision marks the achievement of another significant milestones for the company as it gears up to launch Phase 1 of its service and start construction north of West Palm Beach.

"This is the most critical and final step in the extension of Brightline's service to Orlando, and we are excited to move forward with Phase 2," said Dave Howard, Brightline's CEO. "This was a great year for us as we completed construction on two of our major stations and rail infrastructure, successfully presold tickets and corporate packages to individuals and businesses throughout the region and priced \$600 million in Private Activity Bonds to fund Phase 1. We look forward to launching service to Miami and starting construction north to Orlando in the first quarter of 2018."

For the past four years, the Federal Railroad Administration, the lead agency, has worked with the Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Coast Guard, numerous local agencies, water management districts, cities and counties on the development and issuance of the FEIS. The process included extensive public outreach, including dozens of public meetings and the submission and consideration of thousands of public comments.

The project is moving full speed ahead. Over the next few months, Brightline will finalize the design for the rail infrastructure and the 70-acre Vehicle Maintenance Facility that will be located on Orlando International Airport property. Construction of the system will create thousands of jobs and provide a much-needed link between Florida's two most visited and populated regions.

Brightline's station in Orlando will be located at the Orlando International Airport's new Intermodal Terminal Facility (ITF) that will be the hub of the future South Terminal complex. The ITF is connected to the North Terminal by a recently completed Automated People Mover and includes a 5,000-space parking garage. SunRail, Central Florida's commuter rail system, has a planned connection to the ITF. The completion of the South Terminal will add 16 new gates for international and domestic flights.

Brightline will announce the launch date for the start of introductory service between Fort Lauderdale and West Palm Beach soon. The company expects to become fully operational and extend service into downtown Miami in early 2018.
