MetroPlan Orlando Delegation Report January/February 2023

Work and Upcoming Studies:

Vulnerable Users Safety Working Group

PROJECT MANAGER: MIGHK WILSON

With the Federal government recently awarding MetroPlan Orlando \$3.8 million for a Vision Zero/Safe Street action planning, the focus of the working group for the coming year will be advising on the development of those regional and local plans.

Traffic Signal Retiming

PROJECT MANAGER: ERIC HILL

MetroPlan Orlando has completed procurement of professional services for conducting needed corridor retiming efforts in FY 2022 - 2023. Currently, the before data collection, field observations and analysis for the FY 2022 - 2023 slate of corridors/intersections is being conducted.

Scoping of Regional Equity Plan

PROJECT MANAGER: CYNTHIA LAMBERT

In 2021, MetroPlan Orlando began an equity audit sought to explore the distribution of transportation benefits and non-benefits across the region through a social equity lens as well as to catalog how equity is addressed through existing policies and plans. The initial audit included a qualitative review of best practices and a quantitative analysis of the transportation system in Central Florida with specific emphasis areas referred to as "Equity Analysis Areas."

From the preliminary analysis, MetroPlan Orlando staff determined that a deeper dive was necessary and that we would need to include our local partners to be most effective. Thus, in the fall of 2022, MPO staff crafted a scope for an expansive Equity Plan that covers the preliminary audit and extends to include updates on our Title VI and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) plans.

The Equity Plan will tell MetroPlan Orlando's equity story in an understandable way, while incorporating community feedback. The creation of the Equity Plan will include data analysis and public engagement components. All work on the Equity Plan will be completed by June 2023.

Rock Springs Road and West Orange Trail Extension Studies

PROJECT MANAGER: TAYLOR LAURENT

MetroPlan Orlando recently completed two studies concurrently in the City of Apopka: 1) the Rock Springs Road Study, and 2) the West Orange Trail Extension Study. The Rock Springs Road Study evaluated safety and access improvements at the intersection of Rock Springs Road and Welch Road, and along the halfmile of Rock Springs Road from Welch Road to Lester Road. The study also evaluated the realignment of the intersection of Sandpiper Street with Park Avenue, as well as the addition of sidewalks on either side of Park Avenue to fill existing gaps. The West Orange Trail Extension Study evaluated a connection between the existing portion of the West Orange Trail, which currently ends at Lester Road, and Kelly Park Road, tying into the proposed Wekiva Trail. The study is also evaluating two trail spurs to connect the Trail to the entrance to Wekiwa Springs State Park along Welch Road, and to Wolf Lake Elementary and Middle Schools

and the City of Apopka's Northwest Recreation Complex.

The studies were completed in December 2022 and were conducted in partnership with the City of Apopka and Orange County. More information, including flyover videos on both studies can be found at http://www.metroplanorlando.org/rocksprings.

Health Strategic Plan

PROJECT MANAGER: SARAH LARSEN

The Health Strategic Plan highlights the ways MetroPlan Orlando can enhance the transportation system by planning with health and the environment in mind. This plan illustrates areas where public health improvement through transportation planning is needed most, as well as exploring potential strategies in tackling public health issues. Some of the key components of the plan include supporting healthy lifestyles, improving healthcare access through transportation, and integrating health equity into transportation planning. The goal of the Health Strategic Plan is to provide data-driven solutions to public health issues in order to round out MetroPlan Orlando's commitment to performance-based planning. The Health Strategic Plan was completed in January 2022 and has since been presented to our committees and board. The work has also been shared at statewide and at national conferences.

Regional TSMO Program

PROJECT MANAGER: ERIC HILL

MetroPlan Orlando collaborating with M/TPOs in Central Florida on specific Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSMO) goals and objectives for their agencies. This includes staffing Working Group Meetings, identifying areas of development, knowledge-sharing on emerging technologies in transportation and opportunities for advancing TSMO and alternative funding strategies. Following the virtual Peer Exchange that was held September 13, 2022, a draft TSMO strategic plan for Central Florida has been developed for review and action.

Active Transportation Plan

PROJECT MANAGER: TAYLOR LAURENT | DEPUTY PM: SLADE DOWNS

Building on MetroPlan Orlando's existing plans as well as partner agency bicycle and pedestrian plans, the Active Transportation Plan (ATP) aims to create a cohesive master plan for non-motorized needs in Central Florida. This project includes refreshing our bicycle and pedestrian points of interest (activity centers) and the development of a low-stress network of facilities to allow users to travel to and from destinations safely while using an active mode of transportation.

This project sets goals and objectives for 2050 that will be incorporated into the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan. The ATP is in the early stages of development, with research focusing on partner agency involvement as well as public outreach and comment. The steering committee, consisting of local stakeholders and advocacy groups, has met and is scheduled to reconvene. Technical workshops are scheduled to coincide with MetroPlan Orlando's upcoming Community Advisory and Technical Advisory Committee meetings. Expected completion is December 2023.

Speed Management Network Screening

PROJECT MANAGER: TAYLOR LAURENT

National reports have found that Central Florida consistently ranks one of the highest areas on the Pedestrian Danger Index. Research has also shown that there is a 75 percent chance of a pedestrian fatality if struck by a vehicle at 45 mph, and this reduces to a 30 percent chance of a pedestrian fatality if the speed is reduced to 35 mph.

MetroPlan Orlando recently completed a study to identify roadways where speed is potentially a primary factor impacting safety, resulting in a Critical Speed Management Network. The roadways included in the

analysis were the State Highway System (SHS) roads and functionally classified non-State roads in the three-county area (i.e. federal aid eligible roadways), and the Critical Speed Management Network was selected based on: five-year crash history, five-year crash severity, and connected vehicle speed data (for estimated travel speeds) for each road segment. The study team developed target speed recommendations for the roadways included in the Critical Speed Management Network based upon each roadway's context classification. The results of the study was presented to the MetroPlan Orlando Vulnerable Users Safety Working Group and the final report was completed December 2022.

Ozone Contingency / Carbon Reduction Plan

PROJECT MANAGER: SARAH LARSEN

In July 2021, MetroPlan Orlando partnered with the University of Central Florida (UCF) to create a comprehensive report on the state of air quality in our region that will explore existing conditions as well as future scenarios. The first phase of the report analyzed ground-level ozone and detailed traffic data from Streetlight within the Motor Vehicle Emission Simulator (MOVES) model to determine where pollutant concentrations currently exist in our region. This phase was completed in June 2022 and presented before our committees and board. The second phase of the plan will entail engaging local stakeholders to determine which mitigation strategies are the most appropriate for our community. From this outreach, the UCF research team will explore how different mitigation strategies will impact the region's air quality. This phase is set to be completed in the summer of 2023, finalizing the Regional Ozone Contingency / Carbon Reduction Plan.

LYNX Planning Support

PROJECT MANAGER: SARAH LARSEN

As part of the Consolidated Planning Grant, MetroPlan Orlando, in partnership with LYNX, is advancing key transit planning activities including support for the completed Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan, the Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan (TDSP) Major Update, assistance with the Orange County Transportation Sales Tax Initiative, assistance with Run-Cut Analysis, and APC/Fare box Analysis.

Support for the TAM Plan began in August 2022 and focuses on assisting LYNX staff with monitoring and reporting rolling stock and other capital assets. The work will end in January 2023. The work for the TDSP Major Update began in September 2022 and includes analysis of and outreach to the Transportation Disadvantaged community. The Plan is set to wrap up in June 2023. Assistance with the Orange County Transportation Sales Tax Initiative includes any additional data requests, map requests, or any other additional information and lasts until the vote in November 2022. The Run-Cut Analysis assists LYNX staff with their triannual service update, the next of which is December 2022. Finally, in advance of annual reporting in January 2023, LYNX is assuring accurate passenger counts with the APC/Fare box Analysis.

Safe Streets and Roads for All - Safety Action Planning Grant

PROJECT MANAGER: TAYLOR LAURENT

MetroPlan Orlando was recently awarded a Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Planning Grant in cooperation with each of our three counties and 19 municipalities. To reach zero fatalities as a region, the application requested \$3.8 million in federal funding to develop Safety Action Plans for each participating agency (1 MetroPlan Orlando Regional Plan, 3 County Plans, and 19 Local Municipality Plans). The proposed top-down, bottom-up planning approach would encompass all regional roads where most fatalities occur while also identifying safety countermeasures to create a system of safe local streets.



Ocala/Marion County Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Delegation Report February 2023

TPO Board Adopts Commitment to Zero

On November 29, 2022, the TPO Board adopted Commitment to Zero: An Action Plan for Safer Streets in Ocala Marion. The Plan adoption reflected a year-long process of partner agency and community engagement. Moving forward, five major emphasis areas



were outlined in the Action Plan for citizens and partner agencies to work together on over the next five years in support of the goal of zero fatalities and zero serious injuries in Ocala/Marion County. They include:

- Developing a Culture of Safety
- Speed Management
- Non-Motorized Users
- Run-Off Road Crashes
- Intersection Operations

2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Amendment and State Appropriations

In response to the state appropriations process and to maintain consistency for new projects funded through the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), the TPO Board conducted a 2045 LRTP Amendment Public Hearing on November 29, 2022. A total of 14 projects were amended in the Cost Feasible Element and 1 project in the Unfunded Needs Element. This process included two projects funded through the state appropriations process – NW 44th Avenue from SR 40 to NW 11th Street, new four-lane roadway (\$8 million) and the Dunnellon Trail, multi-modal trail connection from River View to Rainbow Bridge (\$2.5 million)



TPO Publishes 2022 Annual Report

On January 25, the TPO published its Annual Report highlighting major activities over the calendar year. Some of the highlights included the adoption of Commitment to Zero, involvement with state and local events, and the adoption of new planning documents. Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) and Title VI Compliance

In support of the ongoing commitment to federal and state compliance with DBE and Title VI, the TPO Board adopted two key documents in 2022 and 2023 – Disadvantaged Enterprise (DBE) Program and the Title VI Non-Discrimination Plan. The documents serve to guide the TPO in conducting all activities, including procurement and contracting.




Polk TPO Delegation Report - February 2023

Polk Transit Vision 2032 - Following the adoption of the Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update by the Lakeland Area Mass Transit District (LAMTD) in November 2022, TPO staff is working with the LAMTD to continue educating the community on the major projects contained in the plan, as well as the next steps.

- **SunRail & TCAR** one of the items identified in the TDP, is to explore whether to extend SunRail into Polk County. FDOT District 1 is conducting a T-CAR study at this time and coordinating closely with the Polk TPO.
- <u>Lakeland Intermodal Center</u> This Intermodal Center was recommended in numerous plans, and funding has been allocated for a project development and environmental (PD&E) study that has just kicked off. While Citrus Connection begins its NEPA study this year, the need for construction funds was identified in the TDP major update. *TPO Staff Lead – Julia Davis*

2020 Urbanized Area Boundaries - In

January the U.S. Census released the 2020 urbanized area boundaries and populations for the country. In Polk County, the Lakeland and Winter Haven Urbanized Areas grew in population since the last Census and together now have a combined population of over half a million (531,166). The new Census geography indicates that nearly six in every seven Polk County residents live in an urban area. Also, there are two new urbanized areas with a 2020 population of over 50,000 in Polk County which include Four Corners



and Poinciana. These new urbanized areas extend into the adjacent Alliance counties of Osceola, Lake and Orange. *TPO Staff Lead – Ryan Kordek*

Polk TPO January 31, 2023

Polk Vision and TPO Safety Effort – This is a collaborative effort between these two agencies to carry out a multi-part tactical plan that aims to help the Polk TPO meet its target of a 25 percent reduction in bicyclist and pedestrian involved severe crashes by 2026. Focus areas include street lighting and visibility, trail designs and promotion, school access, roadway crossings, bike lanes and sidewalks.


As part of this effort there is the **TPO's Bicycle Safety Supplemental School Education**



Project. This is being implemented with \$200,000 in FDOT funds. At this time the TPO has established a website: www.polksafety.org and branded materials which can be used by all schools in Polk County. The materials are presented in grade-appropriate clusters, in a virtual experience. TPO Lead Staff – Julia Davis and Ryan Kordek

Central Polk Parkway (State Road 570B) -

Florida's Turnpike Enterprise's (FTE) new Draft Work Program for fiscal years (FY) 2024 through 2028 includes funding for design and partial right-of-way (ROW) acquisition for a planned new toll road in eastern Polk County. Called the Central Polk Parkway (State Road 570B), the new road is planned as a 4-lane, limited access, highway from State Road 60 in Lake Wales to the Poinciana Parkway Extension (State Road 538) near the Polk/Osceola County Line and US 17/92. The Poinciana Parkway Extension is planned to connect to Interstate 4 in the vicinity of State Road 429 and together with the Central Polk Parkway will provide an alternative to congested portions of US 27, US 17/92 and Interstate 4 in northeastern Polk County (see map graphic). Additional ROW and construction of the planned project remain unfunded. TPO Lead Staff - Ryan Kordek

Ride the Wave to Resiliency Community Symposium

Annual State of the System Report

This report annually evaluates the state of Brevard's transportation system by detailing the usage and performance trends of transportation modes including – highways, transit, seaport, airport, and space. It also monitors safety, mobility, and congestion levels. Additionally, safety, mobility, and congestion levels are monitored as well as long term trends. Thus, the SOS provides technical guidance to the TPO on where and how state and federal dollars can be programmed to enhance Brevard's transportation system.

Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails Advisory Committee Strategic Assessment

As the SCTPO's emphasis areas and planning practices have evolved, the need for a BPTAC strategic assessment has arisen. The assessment will consider the current structure, purpose, mission and direction of the BPTAC. An evaluation on how the BPTAC should be organized and function in a manner that maximizes and supports the Governing Board in achieving their Strategic Plan goals will be conducted. Improving modal choice and safety for our most vulnerable roadway users will continue to be the main focus. This project will be conducted over the next 8 months.

Grant Development and Identification Tool

The purpose of the tool would be to identify which priority projects are eligible, meet the criteria of the federal grants, and rank highest for potential grant awarding. The goal is to prepare and position ourselves as a county to strategically apply for federal grants through the IIJA bill. The tool is being finalized and was presented to the Transportation Subcommittee in January 2023.

Vision Zero Update

Currently all sixteen cities, the county, and the Brevard County School Board have adopted Vision Zero's goal to eliminate traffic-related serious injuries and fatalities. Efforts will continue to implement various focus areas of the Vision Zero Action Plan.

Planning Projects and Activities

Safe Streets and Roads for All Program

The River to Sea TPO, in partnership with Volusia and Flagler Counties, was selected as a recipient of \$320,000 of funding through the USDOT Safe Streets and Roads for all program to develop a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan to identify implementable strategies aimed at eliminating fatalities and serious injuries on our roadways.

Project Feasibility Studies

The River to Sea TPO sets aside \$200,000 annually in two categories (Traffic Operations/Safety and Bicycle/Pedestrian) to complete project feasibility studies as requested by local government sponsors. Projects are prioritized and studies are initiated at the start of the fiscal year to prepare project applications for the next Call for Projects cycle. The River to Sea TPO recently completed three Bicycle/Pedestrian studies in the cities of Port Orange, South Daytona, and DeLand and is currently undertaking two feasibility studies in the city of Port Orange.

Call for Projects

The River to Sea TPO is now accepting transportation project funding applications for the 2023 Priority Project Process. Applications will be used by the TPO and the Florida Department of Transportation to qualify and prioritize proposed projects for funding. For this year's cycle, the TPO updated the project applications to place more emphasis on the safety and to develop ranking criteria specific to Equity and Resiliency & Sustainability.

Community Outreach Activity

- Families and Communities Together (FACT) Fair The River to Sea TPO is participating in the Volusia County F.A.C.T. (Families and Communities Together) Fairs which are designed to provide parents with information about free resources. The TPO hosted a table at two events held in the fall of 2022 and focused on providing information relevant to distracted driving and bicycle and pedestrian safety. Two more events are scheduled to occur in the Winter/Spring of 2023.
- Annual Holiday Toy Drive The River to Sea TPO held its annual open house and toy drive on Wednesday,
 December 7, 2022. The TPO collected 110 toys and gift cards which were donated to the Department of Children & Families.

Ongoing Projects and Studies

Interchange Feasibility Studies

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is conducting Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Studies for two interchanges along I-95 in Volusia County. Upcoming public meetings will be held to present the preferred alternative at each location.

- <u>I-95 at US 1 Interchange</u> The I-95 at US 1 study evaluates improvements to the I-95 interchange as well as the approximately one-mile segment of US 1 between Plantation Oaks Boulevard/Broadway Avenue and Destination Daytona Lane.
- <u>I-95 at LPGA Boulevard Interchange</u> The I-95 at LPGA Boulevard study evaluates improvements to the interchange as well as along LPGA Boulevard from US 92 to Williamson Boulevard.

b. FDOT District Reports

Vice-Chairwoman Moore recognized Secretary John Tyler and Ms. Rakinya Hinson in attendance representing FDOT District 5 Secretary Tyler, provided a report on behalf of District 5. He told committee members that the hurricane response had been a collaborative effort with the main issues being flooding the road closures, traffic signal outages and the need for a significant amount of debris removal. He reported that SunRail also sustained damage on the southern extension and the flooding on SR 46 prohibited an assessment of road damage until after the water receded. Secretary Tyler reminded attendees that FL511.com is a good resource for road closure information. He also stated that residual and budget impacts are still undetermined at the time of the report. He reported on work program development stating that FDOT recently received their allocation, and is in the process of meeting with District 5 agencies. Secretary Tyler provided updates on several regional projects. Discussion ensued regarding the St. John's River Bridge and where the Ellis Road project fits in on the priority list. Ms. Rakinya Hinson followed and shared with CFMPOA members about funding availability SR 44 roundabout. She reported that cost increases were averaging 24-25% and that the department was in

the process of meeting with M/TPOs to determine project changes. Ms. Hinson reported that the Work Program Public Hearing would be held December 5th-9th with an in-person meeting December 6th at the district office in DeLand. In addition, she called attention to Mobility Week October 21-28, National Pedestrian Safety Month which included Walk to School Day October 5th and White Cane Safety Day October 15th.

Mr. Siaosi Fine, Florida Turnpike Enterprise, reported that the Polk Parkway would have all electronic tolling and SunPass transponders are available.

Ms. Gillette then highlighted the changes included in the latest revised list. She noted that the Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) list is not prioritized, and the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) list is ranked and prioritized.

VIII. Presentations

a. Review of Draft Methodology for Ranking CFMPOA TSMO Projects

Mr. Eric Hill, MetroPlan Orlando, provided information on draft methodology for ranking regional TSMO projects. He told CFMPOA members that the TSMO Consortium proposed adding regional TSMO projects to the CFMPOA Project Priority List. CFMPOA members tasked Mr. Hill with providing a definition for TSMO and ranking for projects. Mr. Hill noted that TSMO projects could mitigate 60% of congestion and there were challenges and opportunities. He provided a definition of the project network adding there were caveats. Mr. Hill added that there was a value proposition involving a regional commitment. He reviewed the ranking criteria including efficiency and multimodal system, economic development and cost efficiency, livability and equity and safety. Mr. Hill provided examples of projects they already had. He reported that the CFMPOA M/TPO directors were in receipt of the draft priority list for review. Ms. Whittington noted that the next adoption of the project priority list would include TSMO projects.

b. Update on the Regional Transportation Systems Management & Operations Program

Mr. Eric Hill, MetroPlan Orlando, gave an update on the Regional Transportation Systems Management & Operations Program. He told CFMPOA members that during a training program he was asked to share TSMO information with District 1 and he was asked how to bring in other M/TPOs to advance TSMO in the region. He provided a map showing the participating M/TPOs and noted that although not listed, Lake-Sumter and Ocala Marion M/TPOs had expressed interest in participating in the effort. Mr. Hill detailed the program accomplishments and information on the Working Group. A survey was conducted with the Working Group and their priorities were to share knowledge, find funding, and prioritize projects. Mr. Hill noted that the NICR grant they received generated two documents; a literature review and a framework for what other groups around the country were doing in terms of TSMO which was used to put together a Peer Exchange held virtually September 13th. The next step, as identified through the Peer Exchange, is to reach consensus on a regional TSMO strategic plan.
